On this day 45 years later we were awarded Phase #2 of our OSLAD Grant in the amount of \$400,000 by Governor Quinn in LaGrange Park. The Illinois Association of Park Districts recently conducted a study throughout the state regarding the relevance of parks and recreation in communities. The study revealed that 9 out of 10 Illinoisans believe that parks and open space improve property values. Additionally, 70% of those surveyed believe their park district represents an excellent value in the community.

Winter Fest

This year's event was held Sunday, January 19. Polar Express

Phase #2 of OSLAD is inclusive of the following items:

- -Construction of NEW multi-purpose field for soccer, lacrosse & football
- -Construction of a new skate park (new element for site)
- -Construction of a pickle ball court (new element for site)
- -Picnic shelter
- -Renovation of fields #3 & #4 with better drainage and life safety improvements with fencing and dugouts
- -Expand the interior park pathways to create a looped trail system within the park for a complete walking path with ADA compliance
- -Wetland restoration with interpretive opportunities near Salt Creek Greenway Trail
- -Renovation of deteriorated southeast parking lot with adjacent bio-swale is to filter surface run off

The Addison Park District was a recipient of this grant in the amount of \$34,650.00 to employ youth between the ages of 16-20 years of age who were brand new employees of the district. The district hired 13 youth from the community for a total of 1,102,25 employment hours. The hiring areas included parks maintenance, recreation, and playground leaders.



PARKS & PLANNING

The Parks and Planning Department is responsible for providing leisure opportunities to the community through the acquisition, design, development, maintenance, and renovation of attractive and functional parks, facilities, and open space.

The department maintains over 281 acres of land that includes 25 parks and numerous facilities that meet special recreation needs throughout the District. The Parks and Planning Department is involved with new park and facility construction and park renovation work from the planning stage through construction and inspection. - The Camp Shelter at Community Park has received a facelift, which includes new cabinets, new overhead doors, painting, soffit and gutter repairs, re-roofing, and the renovation of both men's and women's restrooms.
- The Family Aquatic Center also received major improvements. A new main drain system and a new recirculation line have been replaced. Several concrete slabs (decking) have been re-

placed, resurfacing of the diving boards, and lighting repair. The installation of a new shade system as well as painting the entire pool will be completed in the spring.

- A comprehensive inventory of all trees was made. The goal was to not only gather baseline data on all trees within the parks, but also to pay special attention to the Ash tree population in order to evaluate the level of damage sustained from the Emerald Ash Borer. Also included in the inventory is a section detailing how reforestation should take place over the long term to ensure that the Addison Park District increases its overall tree diversity, which will provide a buffer against future pest or pathogen issues.
- The Sheriff Work Assistance Program (SWAP) of DuPage County was again instrumental in assisting the department in the completion of a few sealcoating projects at Oak Knoll, Nike, and Foxdale Parks. They also provided labor in spreading playground mulch throughout the District.

- Fencing was installed at Links & Tees' maintenance building for security and at Oak Knoll Park. Staff reused the old fencing material that was removed from Community Park in preparation for the OSLAD project.
- The stewardship program which cultivates and maintains the native plantings at Lake Manor continues, along with the newly planted native area at Farmwood Park. Additional parks are being considered for native plantings.
- For the first time in many years, the department was able to create an ice rink. The rink, located at Foxdale Park, was formed on top of the old tennis court. Picnic tables and a restroom facility were also provided for use during the season.


Golf Range Association of America

District Operational Funds by Category




Expenses by Category





Living Social

• Club Fitness ran a promotion for a 1 or 3-month membership. 14 1-month and 27 3-month memberships were purchased. The promotion drove 61 members to our website and 3 to our Facebook site. 100% gave Club Fitness a "thumbs up" rating.

Programs

- Club Fitness offered several new programs over the course of the year. The new programs offered were Youth Yoga, Youth Anti-bullying and Safety Courses, Lifting Beauty: Weight Training for Women, 30 'N' Go, Functional Training and Agility: Balance and Flexibility, Rugged Run Training, Insanity, Aqua Zumba, Suspension Training, Scout Swim and Flying Fish Master's Swim.
- Club Fitness hosted a Community Weight Loss Program which consisted of 50 participants who lost a total of 538lbs.
- The Youth Swim Lesson Program changed a great deal. Tuesdays and Thursdays were added to the schedule which previously only consisted of Saturdays. Also, a 2-day per week option was added. Additionally, the format was changed to include all sessions being held at the same time. This made it very convenient for parents of

multiple children and for staff because it allowed participants to move to the same level without changing class times. Furthermore, the format of the program changed to allow continuous skills testing throughout the sessions so that the children could advance to the next level in the middle of a session rather than at the start of a new session. This frequent progression led to "graduation" ceremonies being held at the end of every class. At the ceremonies, all advancing participants were recognized.

- Participants of the new Rugged Run Training Program was formed a Club Fitness team and participated in the 2013 Tough Mudder competition in May. A team is already being formed to train for the 2014 competition.
- The Boot Camp program grew to include 7 class offerings per week. As a result, a new Boot Camp Flex-pass was implemented to allow participants to take an unlimited amount of Boot Camps for a convenient monthly fee. During the week of Halloween, the New Zombie Apocalypse Boot Camp was offered to give participants a fresh, creative twist on the program by offering traditional Boot Camp workout with the twist of a zombie attack. In the program, the participants were both the prey and the attackers.

but also experienced some of the worst weather conditions in years! The outdoor season was a mix of cool spring, hot and rainy summer and then a quick cool down in October. Due to opening later than most domes, it got off to a slow start but finally began to gain traction in late December and early January. On several occasions, this traction or momentum came to a screeching halt with record snowfall and sub zero temperatures, and prevented many of our regular customers from venturing outside of their homes. This type of spring weather will keep customers coming to the dome instead of going back to their own local golf facility.

- Developed new Summer Junior Golf Program that realized an increase of revenue by \$14,000.00 or a 400% increase!
- Developed additional partnerships with PGA and LPGA Teaching Professionals that led to a 188% increase in instructor fees collected!
- Increased partnerships with local high school and college golf teams and now have 18 organizations (25% increase) registered and receiving special pricing for choosing the golf dome!

• A slight increase in revenue collected for Putters Peak and the golf course compared to the previous year!

As we grow the junior and adult lessons program, partner with more golf industry professionals, and offer reasonable discounts to area golf teams and other organizations, the reputation of the Links & Tees Golf Facility will continue to be that we are cutting edge, vibrant, inclusive and affordable. Staff will not only be developing future golfers, but cultivating future generations of customers! We will also not forget to embrace our current customers. Links & Tees, where "all ages and skill levels are always welcome."

May 2013 featured our 6th annual Park Pride Clean Up event. This event rallies community members to assist the district in park site clean-up, mulch spreading, general maintenance, and flower planting. The event hosted 350 volunteers from local residents to the students of Addison Trail High School, local sports groups, Lutherbook, and Ray Grahm Association.

Recycling Extravaganza Events

May of 2014 kicked off our 1st community wide recycling event at Community Park. The event co-sponsored by SCARCE was a tremendous success. The event was also a collaboration of many community organizations. Additionally, in October the district hosted a 2nd event with the co-sponsor being State Representative Kathy Willis.
